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

Founded in 1916 by C.K. Dozier, a member of the International Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Seinan Gakuin celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2016. Seinan Gakuin was one of the first Japanese academies to incorporate an English educational program into its curriculum and has employed many non-Japanese faculty members since its founding. Seinan Gakuin University (SGU) was accredited as a private Baptist university. SGU was also one of the first Japanese universities to establish international exchange programs with overseas universities and has since welcomed students from all around the world. As one of Western Japan's pioneering universities, SGU has a reputation for its excellent education in a rich, international environment.



Established in 1973, the International Division offers one or two semester programs running from August to December (Fall) / January to May (Spring). The courses focus on Japanese Studies, including Japanese Language, Culture, History, Business and Politics, all of which are taught in English.

Most of the international students are on exchange from universities that have entered into mutual exchange agreements with SGU. These agreements bring in approximately 150 students per year.

Credit Requirement

Students must register for a minimum of 14 credits per semester to maintain student visa status. It is also mandatory for students to take Japanese language courses. Their Japanese class level will be determined based on the results of placement tests.

Absolute beginners who are on exchange for one semester can choose their course curriculum either [Plan A] or [Plan B] based on their preferences.

[Plan A] is designed for those who wish to focus on studying Japanese language.

[Plan B] is designed for those who do not intend to continue studying Japanese language after their exchange at SGU. Full-year students must follow [Plan A] regardless of their prior knowledge or study history of the Japanese language.

Seinan Gakuin University accepts self-financed students into the International Division.

Eligibility

- •A foreign national who will complete, or has completed secondary education and is eligible for undergraduate study at the time of enrollment.
- Must have a GPA of 2.2 or higher on a 4.0 scale.
- •A non-English speaker is required to have proficiency in English to understand classes conducted in English. (TOEFL-PBT 550, TOEFL-iBT 79-80, IELTS 6.0)

*Proficiency in Japanese is not required for admission.

Accommodations

Participants will stay in one of our on-campus dormitories, called International Houses. These dormitories are fully equipped with kitchens, shower rooms, washers/driers, lounges and common areas where you can comfortably relax. Each room has a bed, desk, chair, toilet, and is fully air conditioned. All necessary equipment for living is available in the International Houses, ensuring a comfortable stay during the program. Japanese students also live in the International Houses and are always willing to assist international students in adjusting to life in Fukuoka. We offer a relaxed environment for both study and intercultural exchange.

Meals

There are shared kitchens in each dormitory, so participants can cook themselves. Just under ten minutes on foot, you can go to supermarkets and get groceries. There are also many restaurants around the campus and they offer a wide range of cuisines from many countries. Students can also have meals at on-campus cafeterias at reasonable prices.

Resources

Participants will have access to the library and free wifi.

Insurance

Participants are required to obtain travel insurance which covers all your medical expenses and personal liability during your stay in Japan.











Living in the dormitories is affordable and comfortable, and allows students to live in a culturally diverse environment and make lifelong friendships. SGU has three dormitories on campus, and they are just 5-minute-walk to classrooms . Each dormitory is fully equipped and offers not only a comfortable living environment but also a variety of social and academic activities. Some students might be living on their own for the first time, and may be worried about a lot dormitory life. To support all residents, each dormitory has well trained and helpful RAs on each floor. They will assist residents while they are staying in Fukuoka.

A historic city with modern spirit and a cosmopolitan culture



Fukuoka City, where Seinan Gakuin is located, is situated on the island of Kyushu, the southwesternmost of Japan's four major islands. It is a city built

on commerce, with a population of about 1.6 million, and has developed as the cultural and commercial center of the island. The city enjoys a convenient geographic location with easy access to other Asian nations, only 540 km from Seoul and 870 km from Shanghai, compared to 1,100 km to Tokyo. Its close proximity to the Chinese mainland and the Korean Peninsula has given it a long history as the gateway between Japan and the rest of Asia. Equipped with a large-scale international airport, international ferry services and the largest container port in the region, Fukuoka City is actively fulfilling its role as the "gateway to Kyushu, open to Asia."

Fukuoka makes the most of its fantastic geographic location in a variety of ways. One of the key attractions of Fukuoka is the way it combines the convenience of the city with a rich natural environment. The public transport network is excellent, with rail, bus and subway services that make it easy to get around the city. Rich natural surroundings - sea and mountains - are only about 30 minutes away from downtown. As such, the city is noted nationwide for its delicious regional foods. Visitors from all over Japan and the world will undoubtedly be delighted with the city's rich culinary tradition that capitalizes on using fresh local ingredients. The city is also well known for its youthful vitality, which has nurtured many musicians, entrepreneurs, and entertainers, providing an atmosphere of creative energy and vitality.

Following Tokyo and Osaka, Fukuoka is a popular study destination for international students from around the world. Fukuoka City is engaged in a variety of exchanges not only with Asia, but indeed with the world. It enjoys sister-city relationships with Oakland and Atlanta (USA), Bordeaux (France), Auckland (New Zealand), Guangzhou (China), Ipoh (Malaysia), Yangon (Myanmar) and Pusan (Korea) among others. The city also hosts a wide range of cultural exchange events, international conventions and meetings throughout the year. Thanks to these, Fukuoka has established itself as a truly international city.



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
